

However we have all stuck together and we can't wait to get back on the pitch today, getting back to what we all know and love.



Paraiso had been named in the squad but, after first choice central defender Emma Cross was ruled out through llness on the eve of the match, the youngster was handed a place in the starting line-up and proved herself in dreadful, rain-sodden conditions on the Compton training ground's 3G

Paraiso's smooth transition into senior football was highly impressive to watch but not entirely down to the player herself, said the 17-year-old schoolgirl modestly.

"I'm normally quite a nervous person," she admitted, "but the experienced players around me talked me through everything and kept me calm.

"It was a lot less nerve-wracking than I thought it might be and I thoroughly enjoyed it in spite of the conditions. Although we were on the 3G pitch we were splashing around in puddles and it was never easy to play our football. But I thought we dealt with it well and we thoroughly deserved to win the game.

"Obviously after making my debut I want to get more first team chances, but that's down to the manager and I know I've got to keep working hard to earn those chances." Those chances will almost certainly arise for the Kidderminster youngster after announcing herself in some style on the senior team stage.

"The Cup tie was a great platform for Saf," said McNamara, "and she showed us she's more than capable of playing at first team level, technically and physically. She's given us a selection headache, but the sort of headache a manager likes, and as we get back into league games we will certainly be calling on her again.


"It's credit to staff like (reserve team manager) Sarah Lowden, who are doing a remarkable job in turning young players like Saf into real challengers for first team places. For me that's what it's all about – we want to be looking inside the club rather than outside in terms of building for the future of the women's team."

#5 EMMA CROSS DEFENDER

Emma's football career has gone hand in hand with twin sister Jade's even though the pair occupy different ends of the field. Jade is the goalscoring phenomenon whilst Emma is the cool fleet-footed centre half who calmly mops up opposition attacks.

Having made her way through the junior ranks with Wolves she saw first team action for the first time as a late substitute in a defeat at Newcastle in the second game of the 2012/13 campaign. She made a further two appearances that season, both from the start in County Cup victories, but was a regular for the reserves.

The following term she again completed a full campaign with the second string, whilst also featuring a couple of times for the first eleven. 2014/15 saw her first team opportunities increase, featuring 10 times as Wolves suffered relegation.

The 2015/16 season was her breakthrough campaign as she established herself within the Wolves defence as the team eventually finished as runners-up to Leicester City Women. She also found time to net her first competitive goal for the club,

the final one in a 4-0 victory at Rotherham United.

The following campaign was a victorious one for Wolves as they captured the Midlands Division One title in the last fixture of the season with Emma featuring in all but two of the fixtures. Her major contribution was in the final game of the campaign when, with Wolves needing to win, a second half long range effort from Emma struck the bar and bounced down just over the line with Laura McQuilkin following in to make sure. The goal was the only one of the game and confirmed the title.

Now a regular in the team she missed only one game in 2017/18 as Wolves struggled and were eventually relegated at the season's conclusion. It was a much better campaign that followed as Wolves just failed to bounce straight back, with Emma's excellent reading of the game and her pace helping Wolves to the best defensive record in the league.

Last season she was the mainstay of the defence featuring in all but one game. In what was an ultimately frustrating season she captured her 100th league appearance and her 150th overall. This season she has continued on her merry way, marshalling the defence from her sweeper role.

KELLY DARBY

It's the Darby derby as central defender Kelly Darby prepares to line up against former club Nottingham Forest in today's FA Cup second round tie, which in a first for Wolves Women is set to be live-streamed on the club website

Ex-Aston Villa and West Bromwich Albion player Darby captained Forest for two years ahead of a brief stay at Derby County before joining Wolves last summer.

And after impressively stepping into her new team's defence in their 100 per cent record before the pandemic-enforced curtailing of the National League Division 1 Midlands season, she is looking forward to the challenge of facing a Forest side who were in the top half of the Northern Division – a tier higher than Wolves – as the campaign was brought to its premature close.

"It's always nice to play against one of your old clubs," says Darby, "and I've been looking forward to this match ever since the second round draw was made.

"There's a number of girls still at Forest from when I was there, but they've also signed some brilliant new players. I think they would have been be pushing for a top two or three place in their division if the season had continued, so we know what a difficult game we're in for against them.



"But although I've got total respect for Forest, I do think we can beat them and that's obviously the aim – and we'd love to have a good FA Cup run."

Darby knows all about good FA Cup runs, having reached the quarter-finals and fifth round in successive seasons while she was skipper of West Brom.

And not just reaching those rounds but then facing Super League opponents, first Manchester City in 2015-16 then Birmingham City in the following campaign.

Both games were lost 2-0, but each of them was a great experience for Darby and her colleagues – current Wolves goalkeeper Becky Thomas among them.

"The Man City game in particular was a very special day for us," recalls the 26-vear-old defender. "Albion made a big deal of it with coaches laid on for parents and RTC players; and superb facilities like the dressing rooms at the Man City Academy Stadium were something none of us had experienced before.

"As captain I said to the girls, 'make sure you enjoy the day,' and that's exactly

what we did despite losing the game. I was up against (Scotland striker) Jane Ross and had a few battles with her, and I also had the job of marking (England captain) Steph Houghton at corners, so I had quite a day.

"When we played Birmingham the next season I was up against (England striker) Ellen White, who's the best player I've ever played against in terms of physicality and the ability to find space and to make the right runs.

"Not many players at our level can say they've come up against that calibre of opponent, and they were both brilliant experiences for me."

If Darby is to have the chance of similar experiences in the current campaign then Wolves have to start by bucking the odds to beat a Forest team that will undoubtedly go into the tie as favourites to progress.

But she points to a couple of friendlies in the not too distant past, against Forest themselves in pre-season and another Northern Division outfit, Derby County, more recently, as evidence of Wolves' capabilities against higher-ranked teams

"We lost 3-2 against Forest," she says, "but after going 3-0 down we pulled a couple of goals back and showed we can compete with them. And we beat Derby 2-1, which was a great result against a team who were sitting higher in the table than Forest were when the season was ended.

"An FA Cup tie will obviously be more intense than a friendly and it's going to be a very difficult game for us – but I believe absolutely that we can win it."







Club History

The earliest known Forest Ladies team competed in the Notts and Derby League in the early 1970s. In 1972/73 they became the first team to complete the Grand Triple, winning the League Championship, the League Knock-Out Cup and the League Charity Cup. They were undefeated in 18 games and scored 76 goals, with Karen Dawson accounting for 42 of them. And Leslie Haynes in goal was awarded the Player of the Season.

In 1996 Donna Hilton and Lisa Dawkins, players from the original 1990s side, continued to play while setting up a Forest Ladies Junior Section. They began in season 1996/97 with Under 12s and Under 14s teams which proved successful and still continue today witheams ranging from the newly formed under 7s and Under 9s up to Under 16s.

The senior team progressed and moved from success to success. After several seasons in the Unison East Midlands League they eventually secured the title of the Premier League in 2002/03 and with it promotion to the recently formed Midland Combination. Forest adapted well to the Combination League and finished their first season as runners-up to Coventry City before capturing the title the following season and promotion to the national stage.

They adapted well to second tier football and finished the 2005/06 season in a respectable mid-table position. It was up two places to third the following season before capturing the Premier League Northern Division Championship in 2007/08, their third Championship title in six seasons.

Life in the top dozen clubs in the country wasn't easy, but Forest survived that first season, finishing one point above the relegation zone. They weren't as lucky the following season, finishing 11th, and should have been

relegated back to the Northern Division, however, the advent of the Women's Super League reprieved them. Forest took full advantage of that reprieve and finished the 2010/11 season as League runners-up, seven points behind Sunderland, whilst also finishing as runners-up in the League Cup competition when losing on penalties to Barnet after a 0-0 draw.

The loss of a number of players to Super League teams had a disastrous effect on Forest and they fell to finish bottom of the table in 2011/12 with relegation back to the Northern Division for the following season. The 2012/13 term was a season of consolidation as they finished runners-up to Sheffield Ladies. It also saw their application to join the newly-expanded FAWSL fail.

Season 2013/14 was difficult throughout when the club almost folded following the withdrawal of funding from the men's club. A sponsorship deal with E-Lites provided the club funds to see out the remainder of the campaign, whilst on the field of play they managed to finish fourth.

The following season was a poor one on the playing field as they dropped to a final position of ninth, only three points ahead of the relegation zone. They did manage the last eight of the League Cup but failed to retain the Nottinghamshire County Cup for the first time in nine years.

Playing fortunes improved in 2015/16 and they eventually finished the league in mid-table. They captured the Nottinghamshire County Cup again and made it through to the semi-final of the League Cup.

A drop in form saw a disastrous 2016/17 with Forest falling down the table to finish a single place above the relegated teams, a feat they matched the following season when finishing only two points away from the drop. Improvement followed the following term whilst last season they were back challenging at the top of the table before the Covid cancellation.





Forest Women

Today's meeting is the third time Wolves and Forest have clashed in the Women's FA Cup, each time in the second round.

The first encounter took place in January 2014 at Watnall Road, Hucknall. Wolves were first to have an effort on goal from Dani Selmes which was saved by Vanessa Kinnerley. Forest quickly responded and brought the best out of Tilly Hall who saved at full stretch. It was the home team who took the lead from the resulting corner which was only half cleared to Katrina Greaves and she rifled home a shot from 20 yards.

Forest doubled the lead before the break when Meg Howard was played through and ran clear of the defence to calmly stroke the ball past Hall, despite strong protests for offside from Wolves' players and staff.

The second half saw both sides struggling on the heavy pitch with passes falling short and players slipping all over the place. The game was over as



a contest on the hour mark when Howard again ran on to a long ball over the top to round Hall and shoot into the empty net. Wolves did respond with a couple of half chances but Forest ran out 3-0 winners

The last meeting took place in January 2017, this time at Greenwich Avenue, Basford with the home team a division higher than Wolves. Forest started the game stronger and took the lead as early as the third minute as Charlotte Broad received the ball in the Wolves box, beat a couple of defenders and slotted past Lucy Gardner.



Forest doubled the lead just eight minutes later as they were awarded a penalty when Claire Hakeman was adjudged to have fouled in the box, Andi Bell duly converting. The home team went straight for the jugular and made it three in the 17th minute as Katie Lowder ran from the wing, cut into the box and shot past Gardner into the bottom left-hand corner.

Wolves could have crumbled at this stage but, credit to them, they responded well and had a couple of opportunities before half-time, Jen Anslow hitting a free kick just wide from 20 yards with Laura McQuilkin repeating the feat just before the break as her effort slammed off the bar.

Wolves began the second period with renewed gusto and manufactured a couple of excellent chances before the hour mark. Forest, however, had other ideas and Wolves were undone in the 61st minute when another penalty was awarded to the home team after a challenge by Vicky Brackenbury. Andi Bell again stepped up and slotted home.

Wolves battled on manfully to the end but were unable to breach the home defence and Forest moved through to the next round with a comfortable 4-0 win.

Which brings us nicely around to today's meeting. Will it be third time lucky for Wolves or will Forest complete the hat-trick?







Today we make history. Over the last 30 years Wolves Women have played just over 100 games in April, but today's date is the only one on which we have not played. We were due to play Sunderland back in 1993, however, the pitch was waterlogged and the game took place a fortnight later. Wolves secured a 6-0 win that day in what was Sunderland's last season in the Women's National League as they resigned at the season's end and the club folded.

The men's team have featured 19 times on 4th April, securing seven victories and five draws. Five of those wins have come in the last 40 years; the last was four years ago through the only goal of the game against Nottingham Forest at Molineux.
