Good evening and welcome back to the SEAH Stadium for tonight's league game under the lights against Sporting Khalsa.

We're in the middle of another of those very busy weeks, following on from Sunday's Adobe FA Cup win against Rugby Borough with two quickfire league fixtures against Khalsa, and a trip to Halifax.

Looking back to Sunday, it was another positive result against tough opposition in Rugby, who always make it very difficult and provide a competitive test. Once again, we produced some really good moments, and got ourselves two goals in front, but could have been better in others, and should have been further ahead before they pulled one back and put some pressure on at the end.

With Stoke before it, that's two successive home games against challenging opposition where we've found ourselves protecting a one-goal advantage in the closing stages, and while it would be nice to enjoy a bit more daylight, it's also a big positive to be able to see those situations out. I thought we actually dealt with it better against Rugby than we did against Stoke, and the likes of KJ and Georgia showed leadership and won some big headers to clear the pressure.

We couldn't have asked for a harder tie in the first round of the competition, but a strong team effort took us through, and, writing these notes ahead of Monday evening's draw, it will be interesting to see who we are paired with. Although the cup might not be our priority this season, we have made so many great memories in the competition in recent years, and it would be nice to add a few more to the list over the coming months if we can.

Sunday's win made it 12 games unbeaten from the start of the season which is probably a statistic that none of us could have imagined. It's an excellent achievement, but we are still only a fraction of getting where we want to be, so we have to keep maintaining our levels heading into another two league games in the space of five days.

We need to keep working hard, keep pushing each other on and stay together, so we can maintain that consistency and continue putting points on the board.

With tonight's fixture being our last at home before Remembrance Sunday, we will be paying tribute to the fallen before kick-off, with a moment of silence and the Last Post. With my role with the RAF, this is always a poignant time of year, remembering those we have lost, and it is particularly special for me being able to pay tribute alongside another job I cherish, managing Wolves Women. I look forward to us joining together to pay our respects to honour the service and sacrifice of our Armed Forces.

Welcome to Juan and his staff and players and all connected with Sporting Khalsa this evening, a club with whom we have strong links and have worked well together in sending players out on loan.

Thanks as ever for all your support. Enjoy the game.

OLD GOLD'UNS

If any longstanding Wolves fans here today take a look across to the Sporting Khalsa technical area, they will doubtless spot a familiar face - that of former Wolves player Becky Hall, now Khalsa's first team coach under manager Juan Dopazo.

Hugely talented striker Hall, whose twin sister Natalie was also a key player as the club's goalkeeper for several seasons, followed her three-year spell at Wolves with stints at Birmingham City and, in the FA Women's Super League, with Doncaster Belles - and also made over 50 England appearances at age group levels from Under-17 to Under-23.

The injury-hit latter part of her playing career ended triumphantly, Hall captaining Khalsa to a 2024/25 double of the FA WNL Division One Midlands title and the Staffordshire County Cup.

She then moved on to the club's administrative staff as Player Liaison Officer, a job she now combines with her role as first team coach.

It has been a long and winding road for the now 37-year-old, married with three children and living in the Staffordshire village of Handsacre. That's some 25 miles from Khalsa's Guardian Warehousing Arena and around 125 miles from Reading, where she was born and spent the first 10 years of her life - much of it dominated by football.

Hall says: "I had two older brothers, so it was two-a-side in the garden before Natalie and me started playing for a boys team and then for Reading Royals Girls Under-12's.

"When we moved up this way our dad used to drive us down to Reading every week for Sunday matches, but the travelling got too much and so we joined Lichfield Diamonds.

"We moved to Wolves after we'd been spotted by (ex-Aston Villa captain) Dennis Mortimer. He was the Wolves Women manager at the time and lived near Lichfield, and he always came to watch Wolves' younger age-group teams when they played at Diamonds.

"He had a chat with my dad and invited Natalie and me to pre-season trials. We'd just turned 15 (in May 2003) and everything moved on very quickly from there."

Things did indeed move on very quickly, particularly for Becky who at the start of the 2003/04 season hit eight goals in her first seven appearances for the Wolves senior side.

"I was in the right place at the right time," she says modestly. "Big players were out through injury so I was thrown in as a scrappy 15-year-old.

"I also had my first England Under-17s call-up that season. I made my debut in a mini-tournament in Ireland and scored in both of my first two games, against Northern Ireland and Scotland, so it was a great season for me."

The season that followed was a good one too. In December 2004 she became the club's women's team joint highest scorer in a single game, hitting the net seven times in a 15-0 County Cup win against Dudley United, and by the end of the campaign she had shared 39 goals with strike partner Amy McCann as Wolves finished Northern Division runners-up.

Hall's 2005/06 goal tally also stretched into double figures, but she then moved to top flight club Birmingham City while she was on an FA scholarship at Loughborough University.

"I was room-sharing with (Blues player) Heather Scheuber at Loughborough" recalls Hall, "and she asked me if I might be interested in joining Blues.

"It meant breaking away from my sister for the first time in a footballing sense, but I wanted to test myself in the top league in the country and, after talking to (Birmingham manager) Mickey Moore, I decided to make the move."

Ironically, after parting company football-wise with Natalie, the twins were to face each other twice in successive seasons in Birmingham County Cup finals.



Blues beat Wolves in 2007 and 12 months later won against a West Bromwich Albion side that now had Natalie in goal following her transfer.

"Natalie and I had never played against each other before," says Hall, "and my mum was in tears on that first occasion. We won after extra time and I was delighted to get a medal, but I hadn't played well, and Natalie had been brilliant, so I really felt for her.

"I didn't score in that first final, but I got two goals in the second one and that was a more comfortable win for us"

Hall's next move came in 2009, when the start of the FA Women's Super League was impending and clubs were bidding for a place in what was to become the new top tier.

Looking back, she says: "Birmingham were bidding to get into the WSL, but the club was going through a transitional stage and I thought Doncaster were more of a shoo-in to become one of the first clubs in the new set-up.

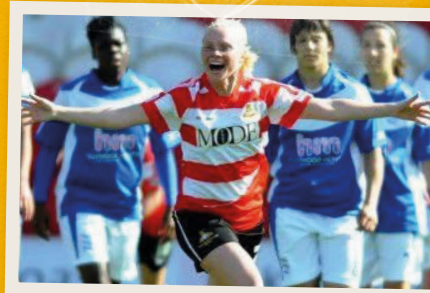


"I spoke to (manager) John Buckley and liked what he had to say, I liked the set-up at Donny, and, although I knew none of the players apart from (goalkeeper) Nicola Hobbs, I decided to sign for them. In a sense it was a leap of faith, and in hindsight it wasn't the best for me.

"I feel that I massively under-achieved at Donny, in terms of goals and assists. I only played one full season - at the start of the next one I broke my ankle, which I did in the dark one night through falling off the step to my mum and dad's front door!

"I came back to Wolves for a while but that ended in a pre-season game against Aston Villa. Right at the end of the game I blocked a ball and seconds later, as the ref blew the final whistle, my leg collapsed under me.

"I had surgery, but the recovery period was really long and I was told I'd never play football again at a decent level. My reaction was, 'I'll show you!' But it took four years to be able to run again, so I decided I'd just play for fun.



"Natalie had just finished playing for Stoke and we joined Shenstone - a Tier 7 club playing in the Staffordshire Women's County League. We had a great time. There was no pressure, we had a laugh with a good group of girls - and we won the league!

"I stayed with them until I got a 'phone call out of the blue from Kidderminster Harriers, who were on the look-out for players who could help them up from Tier 6.

"I was only there for a season and a half, but we won the Worcestershire County Cup twice before I left when there was a regime change at the club."

And so on to Khalsa, who Hall joined at the start of the 2022/23 campaign and has been part of a big success story for the Willenhall-based club.

In 2023/24 they finished third in Division One Midlands - their best ever season up to that point - with Hall then being appointed captain for last term.

"Last season was fantastic," says Hall. "We pipped Loughborough Lightning for the title and ended Stoke's domination of the Staffordshire County Cup.

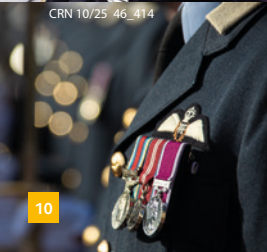
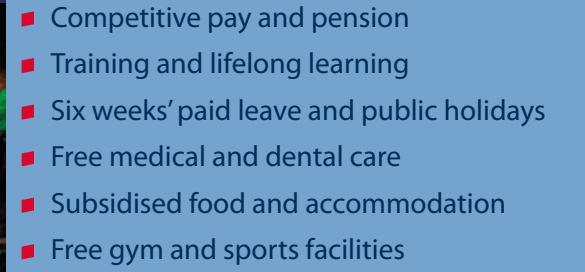


They'd won it for 13 seasons in a row, but we beat them in the semi-final then Leek Town in the final.

"That meant I'd got winners medals in the Birmingham, Worcestershire and Staffordshire County Cups. And after lifting the league and Cup trophies as captain, I decided that it was time to call it a day on my playing career."

Installed at the club now as Player Liaison Officer and first team coach, Hall is aiming to keep Khalsa's trajectory on its upward curve. She says: "I bought into the Khalsa philosophy and love everything the club stands for.

"We know that at the level we're playing at now, every game is tough. But on limited resources we're punching above our weight, we're competing and we're aiming to consolidate and establish ourselves as a Tier 3 club."



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Sporting Khalsa

Formed in 2004 under the name FC Reedswood in the Birchills area of Walsall, the club played its initial football in the West Midlands Regional Women's League. Commencing life in Division One North, they established themselves and were able to push on to become champions in the 2011-12 season, gaining promotion to the Premier Division. They also made their way through to the Stafford County Cup Final where they were defeated by a strong Stoke City.

The following season they finished third in their first season at the higher level before capturing the Premier League title in 2013-14. The success saw them elevated to the National stage as they were promoted to the FA Women's Premier League.

After a comfortable mid-table finish, a major transformation arrived during the summer of 2015 with a move from Long Lane in Eccleshall to the Aspray Arena in Willenhall, forming the Ladies section of Sporting Khalsa and, in the process, taking on their name.

As Sporting Khalsa, things did not start well at the beginning of 2015-16 season and they were in the bottom two places for much of the season. A turn around in results in the last two months of the season saw enough crucial victories gained to finish just above the relegation line. They won their final five games, but were also indebted to Wolves, who avoided defeat against Peterborough Northern Star in the last game of the season, a result that relegated Boro' and helped Khalsa retain their FA Women's Premier League status.

Building on the reprieve they moved up to third the following season before dropping back down to mid-table in 2017-18.

The drop in league position was compensated as they made their way through to the 2nd round of the WFA Cup for the first time.

When football properly resumed after Covid, they again finished mid-table before moving back up to third the following term.

The 2023-24 campaign was the most successful in the club's history as they ultimately captured the Midlands Division One title in an epic battle with Loughborough Lightning. Winning their final eight games of the campaign they captured the title on goal difference, securing promotion to the Northern Division. Alongside this, they captured the Staffordshire County Cup for the first time after suffering defeat in their previous eight finals.

The 2024-25 season saw the Queens finish in a creditable 10th place with a comfortable cushion above the drop zone, and only one point off seventh.

They again reached the County Cup final losing narrowly to Stoke City. The season proved an end of an era as manager Andy Mulligan made the tough decision to step down and first team coach Juan Dupazo took over with the aim of carrying on Andy's good work to move the club forward.

FIRST THING

The first thing I do is brush my teeth, and maybe scroll on my phone whilst brushing my teeth. I'll always have a shower and then get ready.

FOOD AND DRINK

If it's home or away, my Dad and I will always get a coffee. I always have a caramel latte, and he has a flat white. If we're playing at home, I will always have beans on toast with a bit of scrambled eggs, and if it's away, sometimes it changes and I'll have Weetabix, but it's usually beans on toast. But that's because when we're playing at home, it's free, and that's what we're provided, so I'm happy with that.

TALKING A GOOD GAME

I always talk to my Dad. He's a big fan of women's football as well, so he likes to be in on the gossip, and he always takes me to games. Even if it's an away game, he always comes - home or away, he'll be there.

ON THE HEADPHONES

I don't really listen to music on the way into games. I usually just talk to my Dad about life. I try not to think about the game too much on the way there, so we'll have a good catch-up. But once I'm in the changing room, then I'll get on some upbeat songs. You might have seen me signing to 'Texas, Inner Smile' on social media recently. I like to bring the energy to the group, to dance a bit in the changing room as well, put a show on for everyone, and make everyone happy. I try to bring the vibes before the game.

BUS BUDDIES

Usually it's me, Quigs, Anna, Lou, Marty and AJ. That's the table that we'll usually be on - it's the loud table, so I think that's why no one likes to sit by us! Most of the others just stare at us. They might join in a bit, but I think they just judge us.

AT THE GROUND

I always keep the same energy. I don't try and think much about the game. We always look at the pitch first, and then I'll put the music straight on. If I'm too serious, I think the girls notice straight away, so I feel like it's my responsibility to keep the energy up. But I like to do that anyway and I think that's just me as a person.

GAME MODE

As soon as Macca gives us the team, like an hour before, and we start warming up, people probably question sometimes if I'm ok because I do change the way I am. I am very switched on as soon as the game starts. But I find that change pretty easy as my main focus is football. I find it easy to switch on because that's what I want to do for my career and I do pride myself on being professional but also having that side of me that's fun and bubbly as well. In training I do joke around a lot, but I feel the way I play, I am quite bubbly, I have energy and like to run around and win the ball back, so my energy as a person and the way I play is quite similar.

POST-MATCH PLANS

As a team, the first thing we always want to do is say thank you to the fans who have come out to support us. Speak to a few of them, take pictures and sign autographs, and then once we go back in the changing room if we've won, we'll put the music on, dance a bit more, sing along. But on the way home, me and my Dad will always go and get a takeaway. A Popeyes has opened 20 minutes from my house, so we'll always go to Popeyes and I'll usually get a chicken burger with a brioche bun. It's delicious. It's the statement piece every week.

SWITCHING OFF

I find it quite easy to switch off after, but I live quite a busy life anyway, because I'm studying at Uni at the minute and I also work part time in a little coffee shop, which is fun. My boyfriend usually comes and sees me after a game, and then I'll just be chilling with my sister because I don't really see her in the week that much, so I'll switch off and watch a bit of YouTube. But when it comes to reflecting on the game, I think it's important, especially if I didn't think I had a great game personally, and it will play on my mind a bit, and dampen my mood a bit. Although it's important to reflect, I also like to leave it behind as soon as possible, because the games come very quick in the week. Last year, we had a few results that did affect the girls a bit, but I feel our group's quite positive, so when we're back into training on Tuesday, we'll speak about it, but then our focus is on the next game.
